

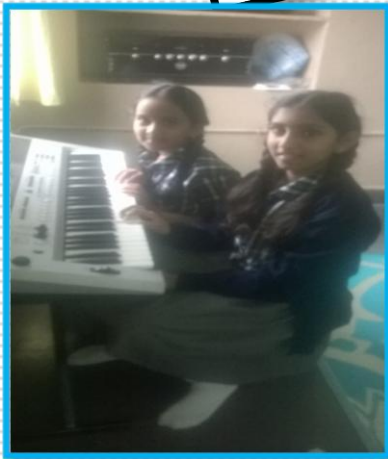

Learning to play an instrument can help the child fine tune his/ her ear and enhance skills needed for education and social interaction.

An introductory class was conducted for the students where in they were split into two groups – Key Board and Guitar based on their interest to learn and pursue their music sessions. Key Board is a wonderful and simple instrument to learn. Students who chose Key Board started learning to play

the notes with great enthusiasm. They understood that each note has its own unique pitch. They learnt how to use their fingers while playing the white and black keys.





They understood the fact that if they want to learn the instrument, they should be willing to go that extra step of practice. So, with each class they put up their best efforts to learn the notes taught by the teacher. They enjoyed the sessions well.



Compared to Key Board, Guitar needs more practice and skill to operate. So, the students who opted for guitar were shown how to hold it properly and tune it.



Tuning of guitar is very essential before playing.

To begin with, they were taught some easy form chords to build skills. They were asked to practice the same till they get the hold of the instrument. Eventually, they will be learning more chords and chord progressions.



Learning instruments help children develop coordination and motor skills. Before they play the instruments to produce music, they should learn how to hold it, place it and tune it.



Playing an instrument teaches kids to persevere through hours, weeks and months of practice. They require focus and rapt attention to learn to play any instrument.



They were taught to wait for their turn patiently, listen to their classmates play, respect their peers and be attentive for designated periods of time. Group lessons helped children understand that nobody, including themselves or their peers is perfect and that everyone has room for improvement.

Students will be familiarized with the instruments they have chosen and will be given more lessons in the coming up sessions.
